#### A. General introduction

# 1. A group of administration & transferring Fund

This year, our administrative team includes one director, one secretary, four assistants, and 33 local partners—29 based in Thailand and 4 along the Burmese border.


These *local partners* play a vital role in overseeing our sponsored students in their home communities. They come from various backgrounds: farmers, teachers, workers, housewives, religious sisters, and priests. They receive funds from Fr. Dzung and help distribute them to individual students or the centers where the students reside.



#### 2. Map of sponsored places

We currently have 25 locations with code names spread across four provinces in Thailand—Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai, Mae Hong Son, and Tak—as well as four additional locations along the Burmese border.

This year, we have added four new locations, which are highlighted in yellow. Meanwhile, two locations (Huai E Kang and Huai Tong) have been removed from the list, as those villages have begun receiving government support, and the students' families are now able to afford their education.



# 3. Visiting trips for our sponsors

Along with the map showing the locations of our sponsored students, we are happy to offer the opportunity for sponsors to visit their sponsored students in person. If any sponsor is interested, we can help organize a visit, which can also include

stops at some of the beautiful and culturally rich attractions in Northern Thailand. To plan such a visit, we kindly ask sponsors to share their ideas or preferences for the trip in advance. We will do our best to accommodate and arrange everything accordingly.

Please note that sponsors will need to cover all expenses related to the trip, including transportation, accommodation, meals, and a guide (if required), as our scholarship fund has a very limited budget and cannot support travel costs.



# 4. Survey Trips

In 2025, we conducted our annual survey trip from March 5 to 17. During this trip, we were able to meet with nearly all of our sponsored students. We also had the opportunity to meet our local partners, who shared their reports on the situations of the students and explained how the scholarship funds were used for both the previous and upcoming academic years.

To help our sponsors better understand the impact of their support, we have included many photos in this report. These images highlight the real-life stories of our students and show how your generosity is helping to bring joy, hope, and a brighter future to those in need.

# **B.** The Survey Trip

(March 5-17, 2025)

On March 5, 2025, four of us – Fr. Dzung, Omem, Meechai, and Ying – began a 13-day survey trip across Northern Thailand. Our goal was to visit our sponsored students in various locations. During each visit, we spent time having short conversations with the students, discussing how the scholarship funds were received and used, as well as learning more about their daily lives and studies.



# (1) Mae Salee (Code: MS)

We met with Mrs. Tar and all 16 of the students we support this year.







# Use of Fund (47,000 Baht)

The funds are not distributed directly to individual students. Instead, they are kept in Mrs. Tar's account and used collectively for the following purposes:

- School supplies (shoes, pencil, notebooks)
- Transportation

**Note:** Our sponsored students attend Maelid School, which is located 8 kilometers from Mae Salee village. Although the school provides free tuition, lunch, and some basic supplies, this support is not sufficient to cover all their needs.

# (2) Mae La (Code: ML)

Upon arriving at Mae La Village, we were joined by Kevin and his wife for the visit. We met with Mrs. Omem, the teachers, and our sponsored students at Mae La School, which serves children from kindergarten through elementary level (Pathom 6). This year, we are supporting 82 students, including several children from underprivileged families in nearby villages.







# <u>Use of Fund (290,000 Baht)</u>

The funds are not distributed directly to each student, except for those who completed Pathom 6 this year. The remaining funds are managed through Mrs. Omem's account and used for:

- Teacher's monthly salary (6,000 Baht/month)
- Clean water (6,000 Baht/year)
- Transportation for school activities
- Christmas gifts and Ice-cream for the students

**Note:** This village previously had no internet access. A portion of the funds this year was used to install an internet system for the school.

#### (3) St. Paul Church (Code: PC)

The next day, we visited St. Paul Church, a new location now under the care of Fr. Boonlert. Within the parish grounds, there is a hostel exclusively for female students who attend the nearby Mae Sariang Boripat Suksa School. Two religious sisters are responsible for managing the hostel. During our visit, we met with Fr. Boonlert's assistant, Fr. Chanchai, and our sponsored students. This year, we are supporting 9 girls at this location.







# Use of Fund (45,000 Baht)

Each student receives individual support, which is used for:

- School uniforms
- Tuition fees (4,500 Baht per semester)
- Daily meals

# (4) Huai Kong Po (Code: KP)

Huai Kong Po is another new location we are supporting this year. It is both the name of the village and the local school, which serves students from kindergarten to Pathom 6. The school welcomes children from five nearby villages. Because of its proximity to the Burmese border, many of the students are Burmese children who have fled their country.

During our visit, we met Mr. Suthipong, the school principal and also our dedicated local volunteer partner. We also had the opportunity to meet with the sponsored students. This year, we are supporting 30 students at Huai Kong Po.







# Use of Fund (83,000 Baht)

The funds are not distributed directly to individual students. Instead, they are managed through the school's account and used collectively for:

- School uniforms
- Karen traditional clothes
- Support for other students (shared with 60 students in total)

# (5) Khun Yuam (Code: KY)

Arriving in Khun Yuam in the afternoon, we joined the evening Mass. After the Mass, we had a brief meeting with Fr. Santi and our sponsored students at the center. This year, we are supporting 24 students at this location.







# Use of Fund (72,000 Baht)

- Providing each student with a small portion of the funds (500–1,000 Baht per student)
- Supporting special celebrations (birthdays, graduations, Children's Day)
- Making necessary repairs (e.g., roof, ceiling, doors)
- Covering medical expenses and hospital visits

**Note**: Every student staying at this center is required to pay 5,000 Baht per year. Their parents are responsible for all educational materials, including uniforms, books, and notebooks.

# (6) Tak (Code: TR)

This was our first time meeting Mrs. Ple in person, after many years of working with her remotely. She has helped us transfer scholarship funds to students in Tak refugee camp. Previously, her sister, Mrs. Maliwan, was our primary contact. This year, we are supporting 48 students, divided into four groups based on their locations:

- 1. E Thoo Tha Dormitory (Burmese border)
- 2. Mae La Oon (Burmese border)
- 3. Mae Ra Moo Dormitory (Burmese border)
- 4. Sao Hin (refugees from Burma now living in Thailand)

Mrs. Ple works for the Coeur Foundation inside a refugee camp and is in charge of these four areas. We met her at her office in Maesariang. Although we were eager to visit the sponsored students directly, we were unable to do so due to restrictions within the refugee camps.



# *Use of Fund* (175,000 Baht)

The money is transferred to Mrs. Ple and divided into two parts:

- Part 1: Each student receives 1,000 Baht in cash individually.
- Part 2: The remaining funds are used for:
  - Buying rice and dry food for students living with their families
  - Supporting dormitory managers in purchasing essential supplies such as rice, medicine, cooking oil, and canned fish for all students in the dormitories

**Note**: The cost of goods inside the refugee camps is significantly higher than outside, which makes these contributions especially vital.

# (7) Omkoi (Code: OK)

On March 7, we visited the Catholic Center, where we met Fr. Uthai, the new parish priest and director of the center. We had a short conversation with him and our sponsored students to learn more about their living and study conditions.

Last year, due to uncertainty regarding the use of funds by the previous priest, we consulted with the Bishop, as the center is under his jurisdiction. After careful discussion, the Bishop asked us to continue our support for the students at the center.

Following our meeting with Fr. Uthai and the students, we received confirmation that they are from economically disadvantaged families and genuinely need assistance to pursue their education. This year, we are supporting 22 students at this center.







#### Use of Fund (84,000 Baht)

The funds are not distributed directly to individual students. Instead, they are managed through the parish's account and used collectively for:

- Daily food and meals
- Repair and maintenance of computers and internet access

**Note**: The diocese provides 30,000 Baht per month to support the center, but this amount is not sufficient to cover daily meals and essential tools for students' studies, such as computers and internet service.

#### (8) Zibrea (Code: ZB)

On March 8, 2025, we visited Zibrea and met with Mr. Prasert, the principal of Zibrea School. The school serves students from kindergarten to pre-high school (Mathayom 3), with a total of 235 students.

This year, we are supporting 94 students:

- 67 students are currently studying at Zibrea School.
- 27 students are studying at other schools outside the village.







# *Use of Fund* (211,000 Baht)

The funds are divided into two portions:

#### **Portion 1** – 27 Students Studying Outside:

- Each student receives 500 Baht in cash.
- Additional funds are used to buy school uniforms, shampoo, blankets, and other personal necessities.

# **Portion 2** – 67 Students Studying Inside Zibrea School:

- Funds are not distributed individually.
- They are managed by the school and used for:
  - Transportation costs
  - Study materials such as uniforms, shoes, school bags, and personal hygiene items

#### (9) Chom Thong (Code: CT)

On March 9, 2025, we arrived in Chomthong District and visited the Mae Pon Religious Congregation Center, where we met Sister Mod, our local partner, along with other sisters who help manage the center. This center serves high school students (Mathayom 1 to 6). We were also able to meet several of our sponsored students during the visit. This year, we are supporting 12 students at this location.







#### Use of Fund (53,000 Baht)

The funds are not given directly to individual students. Instead, they are managed through the foundation's account and used collectively for:

- Educational materials, including a printer and A4 paper
- Transportation costs
- Repairs, specifically fixing toilet doors at the center

# (10) Huai Yao (New Code: HY) Huai Tong (Code: HT)

We arrived at Huai Yao Village and met Mrs. Maliwan, our local partner. She and her daughter, Cherry, are responsible for overseeing our sponsored students from Huai Yao and previously from Huai Tong (HT).

**Significant Change:** Mrs. Maliwan informed us that the economic situation in Huai Tong Village has improved significantly. The students' families there are now able to support

their education. As a result, we have decided to discontinue sponsorship for the 12 students from Huai Tong starting this year.

Students from Huai Yao Village, however, still need our support. To avoid confusion going forward, we have also updated the name and code of this location to reflect the focus solely on Huai Yao. We support 30 students.







#### *Use of Fund* (122,000 Baht)

- Transportation from Huai Yao to Huai Tong School (2 vehicles): 8,000 Baht/month
- The remaining funds will be used to purchase educational supplies for the students

# (11) Nong Tao (Code: NT)

We continued our journey to the Nong Tao Christian Center, where we met with our local partners, Mr. Janthip and his daughter Lukkaew. This year, we are supporting 49 students in total — 18 students live in the Center, while 31 students stay with their families in Nong Tao Village.







# Use of Fund (112,000 Baht)

The funds are divided into two portions based on the students' living situations:

#### **Portion 1** - 31 Students (Living with Families):

- Funds are given directly to each student
- Used for: food, school shoes, educational materials, personal necessities, and transportation

# **Portion 2** - 18 Students (Living in the Center):

- A small amount is given to each student individually (500–1,000 Baht)
- The remaining funds are used collectively for: food, educational supplies, household tools, and Christmas gifts

# (12) Nongmontha (Code: MT)

On March 10, 2025, we visited the Nongmontha (also called Mowakhi) Learning Center, which provides education from Kindergarten to Pathom (elementary school). We met our local partners, Mr. Bunchai and Mrs. Supaporn, along with all the children and students supported by our program. This year, we are supporting a total of 67 students.







# *Use of Fund* (149,000 Baht)

The funds are allocated into two portions based on the students' living situations:

# **Portion 1** – 20 Matthayom Students (Living with Families):

- Funds are given directly to each student
- Used for: food, school uniforms, and transportation

# **Portion 2** – 47 Students (Living at the Center):

- Funds are not given directly to the students but are managed through the school's account and used for:
  - Food (30% of the total budget)
  - Hiring a teacher (10,000 Baht per month)
  - Hiring a cook (4,000 Baht per month)

#### (13) Khunwin (Code: KW)

As we continued our journey, we visited the Khunwin Learning Center, which provides education from Kindergarten to Pathom (elementary school). During the visit, we met with our local partners, Mrs. Rupor and Mrs. Maela, along with the sponsored students. This year, we are supporting 18 students at this center.







# Use of Fund (36,000 Baht)

The funds are not given directly to individual students, but are managed by the two teachers and used collectively for:

- School supplies (uniforms, books, and notebooks)
- Installing a water pipe
- Vegetable planting for student meals and learning

# (14) Mae Pang (Code: MP)

The sponsored students under the Mae Pang (MP) code come from various locations. On this trip, we visited only the Christian Center in Ban Kae Noiy village, where we met with Mr. Jafa. Unfortunately, we were unable to meet the sponsored students during our visit as they were attending classes.

This year, we are supporting a total of 34 students under the MP code. At this specific center, 15 sponsored students are currently residing. These students range from kindergarten to elementary level (Pathom 6). Once they complete elementary school, they move on and leave the center.

Mr. Ken continues to serve as our dedicated local partner, overseeing all students sponsored under the Mae Pang (MP) code.



# The way of using Fund (98,000 Baht)

The funds are transferred to Mr. Ken's bank account, who manages the disbursement in three portions:

- **a. Portion 1**: Transferred to Mr. Jafa, who oversees students at the Christian Center in Ban Kae Noiy. This portion is used for:
  - Semester fees (for some students)
  - Uniforms, sports & scout suits, traditional Lahu clothing, sweaters, pants, and shoes
  - Dry food
  - Hospital expenses
  - Electricity
- **b.** Portion 2: Used by Mr. Ken to purchase necessary items directly for the students instead of giving cash. These include:
  - Rice, noodles, canned fish
  - Medicines
  - Umbrellas
- **c. Portion 3**: Transferred to individual students:
  - If the student has a bank account, the money is transferred directly.
  - If not, the funds are transferred to their parents.

#### (15) XLC (Xavier Learning Community) (Code: XL)

Xavier Learning Center is a Jesuit-run institution, now affiliated with Seangtham College and officially named "Seangtham College, Xavier Campus, Chiang Rai." It offers a Bachelor of Arts degree through its Faculty of Liberal Arts, focusing on English for education, religion, and culture. This full four-year program provides students with a strong academic foundation rooted in values-based education.

Our team visited the college on March 12, 2025, where we met with our local partner, Mrs. Pimon, and several of our sponsored students. This year, we are supporting 45 students at this institution.







# Use of Fund (450,000 Baht)

- The entire fund is used to cover school fees.
- Each student pays 5,000 Baht per term, totaling 10,000 Baht per year.
- Our fund ensures these fees are fully covered for each sponsored student.

 Other educational materials, such as printing papers, books, and notebooks, are not covered by the fund.
 Students are expected to either purchase these themselves or receive them from the college.

#### (16) Soblan (Code: SL)

This year, we are supporting 5 students from Soblan village. Due to scheduling constraints, we were unable to visit the village in person, as the students had not yet returned home at the time of our trip. However, our local partner, Mrs. Doeung, kindly sent us photos of the students and provided updates on their situation.



# Use of Fund (25,000 Baht)

- The funds are given directly to individual students.
- The money is used for: uniforms, transportation, food, and lodging

# C. Special Places

# (1) Three places on the Burmese border side

- Klor Kee Der,
- Lay Tho Ko
- Kaw Thoo Lei

Mr. Meechai, our assistant, oversees the sponsorship activities in three locations: Klor Kee Der, Lay Tho Ko, and Kaw Thoo Lei. The allocated funds for these places are first transferred to Mr. Meechai's bank account. He then withdraws the cash and personally delivers it to our local partners, who live and work closely with the sponsored students in each area.

Below is a brief introduction to these three locations:

#### (1. a) Klor Kee Der (Code: KD)

The school is called Klor Kee Der School, offering education at the elementary level (Pathom 1 to 6). The sponsored students come from Klor Kee Der and Booborkey villages. Our local partners are Mrs. Easter, a teacher in Klor Kee Der, and Mr. Thoober, who supports students in Booborkey. This year, we are supporting 78 students in this area.







# *Use of Fund* (159,000 Baht)

The funds are allocated as follows:

- **Booborkey School:** Used for food, teacher stipends, and a small individual allowance (100–200 Baht per student).
- **Klor Kee Der Dormitory:** A small cash allowance (200 Baht per student), food expenses at the dormitory, and support for the dormitory leader.

# (1. b) Lay Tho Ko (Code: LK)

The sponsored students at Lay Tho Ko fall into three groups:

- 1. Students residing in the dormitory
- 2. Students staying with their families
- 3. Burmese students who have fled the civil war

All sponsored students study at Lay Tho Ko School, which provides education from Pathom 1 to Pathom 6 (elementary level).

Mrs. Shernay, our local partner, is responsible for overseeing the students in this area. This year, we are supporting 47 students at this location.





# <u>Use of Fund (139,000 Baht)</u>

The funds are used for the following purposes:

- Monthly salary for ten teachers (3,000 Baht per teacher per year)
- Dry food for the students
- A small portion is given directly to each student (200 Baht per person)

# (1.c) Kaw Thoo Lei (Code: KT)

This is the dormitory where our sponsored students stay. The nearby school offers education from elementary to high school level (Pathom to Mathayom). Mrs. Paw is our local partner overseeing the students. This year, we support 30 students.





# Use of Fund (115,000 Baht)

The funds are not distributed directly to individual students. Instead, they are used collectively for the following purposes:

- Purchasing rice, cooking oil
- Toiletries such as toothpaste and shampoo
- Internet expenses
- Annual salary for one dormitory staff member
- Roof repairs

# (2) Bankad (Code: BK)

Bankad is a dormitory for lower and upper secondary school students (Mathayom 1 to 6). It is under the care of the Seven Fountains Jesuit Spirituality Center. Mrs. Nong, our local partner and staff member, is in charge of the dormitory and supervises our sponsored students. This year, we are supporting 30 students at this location.







# <u>Use of Fund (150,000 Baht)</u>

The funds are not distributed directly to individual students. Instead, they are used collectively for the following purposes:

- Water, electricity, and internet
- Food (2,000 Baht/month)
- Monthly salary for Mrs. Nong (7,500 Baht)
- Repairs and maintenance as needed

#### (3) Seven Fountains Inside (Code: SI)

The sponsored students under this code are university students residing in two dormitories managed by the Seven Fountains Jesuit Spirituality Center. We support 15 students.

- **Saint Paul Dormitory** (for female students) is located opposite Chiang Mai University.
- **Arrupe Dormitory** (for male students) is situated approximately two kilometers from the university.







# <u>Use of Fund</u> (120,000 Baht)

The funds are not distributed directly to individual students. Instead, they are collectively used to support the dormitory and community life:

- Water and electricity bills
- Monthly dinner gatherings
- Repairs and maintenance of the facilities

#### (4) Seven Fountains Outside (Code: SO)

The sponsored students under this code come from various locations, with the majority currently enrolled in university programs. Most of them have learned about the sponsorship fund through our network of local partners. This year, we are supporting 80 students under this category.



# <u>Use of Fund (316,000 Baht)</u>

The funds are distributed directly to individual students. In the case of students under twelve years old, the money is transferred to their parents. The financial support is used for essential academic needs, including:

- School fees
- Uniforms
- Books
- Transportation
- Other study-related materials

#### (5) Special Cases (Code: SC)

The "Special Cases" category includes students who seek assistance after we have finalized the sponsorship documents for the year. These students are considered on a case-by-case basis, and if their situations are deemed truly difficult, we extend support using any remaining general funds. Once accepted, their names remain under this code until they complete their education. This year, we are supporting 7 students under Special Cases.

# *Use of Fund* (107,000 Baht)

The funds are given directly to individual students and are used for: school fees and other essential educational needs (books, uniforms, transportation, etc.)

# (6) University & College (Code: UC)

This year, we have created a distinct group for university and college students to encourage connection, build community, and organize special activities for them. Through the scholarship fund and opportunities to meet in person, we hope to inspire a sense of gratitude toward our generous sponsors. More importantly, we aim to raise awareness among these students about the value of giving back—encouraging them to support other underprivileged children in the future, just as they have been supported. This year, we have 1 new student in this category.



# Use of Fund (13,000 Baht)

The funds are given directly to individual students and are used for school fees.

# (7) Jesuit Candidates (Code: UC)

Most Jesuit candidates in Thailand come from poor families. The Society of Jesus provides them with accommodation and supports their education. However, with the recent relocation from Chiang Rai to Bangkok, the tuition fees have significantly increased—from 5,000 baht to 20,000 baht per year—placing an additional financial burden on the Jesuit budget.

Recognizing their difficult situation, our scholarship fund program extends support to help meet this need. This year, we support 6 out of 20 candidates, providing 10,000 baht per student.





# *Use of Fund* (60,000 Baht)

The funds are not given directly to individual students; they are kept in the foundation's account and used to pay school fees.



#### **D. Summary**

# 1. How many students do we help this year (2025)?

In total, our scholarship program supports 25 locations—3 in Myanmar and 22 in Northern Thailand.

This year, we are supporting **879 students** through our collective efforts and the generous contributions of our sponsors.

#### 3. How is the Fund transferred?

In general, there are two ways:

- 1. NOT giving to individual students: In this method, funds are managed by local partners and used collectively for a group of students. These students either attend the same school or live in the same dormitory (Center). The money covers:
- o Personal needs (e.g., shampoo, toothpaste, hygiene items)
- Educational supplies (e.g., school fees, uniforms, books, notebooks)
- Shared expenses (e.g., water, electricity, repairs, dormitory maintenance)

- **2.** Giving to an individual: In this case, the money is either:
- o Transferred to the student's bank account or
- Given in cash directly to the student or their parents
- o If the student is 12 years old or older, the money is handed to them directly.
- If the student is under 12, their parents receive the funds.
   These funds are used to cover personal and educational expenses, such as transportation, school supplies, and basic needs.

# 4. The way of using money from the Scholarship Fund

- 10% for teachers/persons providing care support
- 30% for food at school and dormitory
- 10% for maintenance of the school or dormitory
- 50% for Books/Stationary/Uniforms/Shoes, items and activities related use for education

#### 5. Why do the sponsored students leave the list?

There are some reasons:

- 1. Some students have graduated from their school, dormitory, or center. After leaving, our local partners are no longer able to follow up with them, and the students have not contacted us to request continued support from the scholarship fund.
- **2.** Some students have discontinued their education for various reasons, including:
  - a. Personal choice they have decided not to continue studying.
  - b. Family or external pressures they left school to help their family or due to conflict, such as the war affecting students on the Burmese border.

- c. Loss of contact our local partners can no longer reach them, or they have stopped responding.
- d. Support from other sources they are now receiving assistance from other organizations or foundations.
